COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is an introduction to aspects of the correctional function in criminal justice, including organization, process, procedure, and clients incarcerated and on conditional release.

COURSE COMPETENCIES

Module 1: The Correctional Framework

1. Examine the components of the corrections system
2. Describe the early history of correctional thought and practice
3. Identify key events in the history of corrections in America
4. Formulate different methods of punishment of offenders
5. Apply the law of corrections
6. Describe the characteristics of the correctional client

Module 2: Correctional Practices

1. Describe the function of jails: detention and short-term incarceration
2. Identify the goals of Probation
3. Discuss intermediate sanctions and community corrections
4. Evaluate America's system of incarceration
5. Describe the prison experience and the concept of "institutionalization"
6. Examine the differences in incarceration for women versus men
7. Apply techniques of institutional management
8. Identify various institutional programs and their related goals
9. Examine the procedures and effects of release from incarceration
10. Describe the concept of "Making It"

Module 3: Correctional Issues and Perspectives

1. Identify incarceration trends
2. Reflect on race and ethnicity issues in corrections
3. Examine the pros and cons of the death penalty
4. Describe the system of surveillance and control in the community
5. Explain the concept of "Community Justice"

MINIMAL STANDARDS

CRJ 115 is designed for completion in one semester. A final grade of C must be earned for successful completion of this course. Failure to earn a letter grade of "C" would mean that competencies for the course have not been adequately met. Therefore, students earning a final grade lower than C must repeat the course. All assignments/assessments are expected to be submitted/completed within the specified time frame. Late work will be accepted at the discretion of the instructor and will be outlined in the addendum to the syllabus.

Attendance Policy

- has been absent from a class more than 20 percent of the hours assigned

Module 1: Exam, Written and Oral assignments - 30%

Module 2: Exam, Written and Oral assignments - 30%

Module 3: Exam, Written and Oral assignments, written project or paper - 40%
