## **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This course includes the study of the behavior of households and firms, including supply and demand, elasticity, price/output in different markets, pricing of resources, regulations, and comparative advantage and trade.

## **COURSE COMPETENCIES**

### **Module 1**

1. Describe economics including a comparison of the studies of Macroeconomics and Microeconomics.
2. Analyze the forces of supply and demand on equilibrium price and quantity.
3. Apply the concepts of elasticity in the consumption and production of products.
4. Explain how the concept of diminishing marginal utility influences consumer behavior.
5. Discuss the merits of price floors and price ceilings.
6. Identify legal ways in which business can be organized in the United States and discuss the advantages and disadvantages associated with each.

### **Module 2**

1. Outline the basic characteristics of market structures.
2. Calculate and graphically illustrate costs of production.
3. Calculate and graphically illustrate revenues and profits used to determine profit maximization.
4. Explain and graphically illustrate production decisions in various markets structures in the short-run and the long-run.

### **Module 3**

1. Describe the role of government regulation in various levels of competitive situations.
2. Discuss antitrust legislation and its success and failure in market regulation.
3. Explain how wage rates are determined.
4. Discuss the American Labor Movement.

### **Module 4**

1. Explain market failure and ways in which government attempts to correct such failure.
2. Describe how income is measured and distributed among households in the United States.
3. Explain the plight of the American poor.
4. Explain how developing countries differ economically from developed countries.

## **MINIMAL STANDARDS**

A minimum of 60 percent accuracy on evaluative instruments (see evaluative procedures) will be required to receive credit for this course. A minimum of 70 percent accuracy on evaluative measures will be required for the course to attain transferability.

## **GRADING**

Competencies are evaluated through the use of four objective and/or essay type exams, written assignments, and other means specified by the instructor. Each module will be evaluated as 25 percent of the final grade. No comprehensive examination is required for this course. For this course, grading will be determined in the following manner:

5. Follow oral and/or written instructions in completing all assignments.
6. Complete and submit all assignments in the specified time period.
